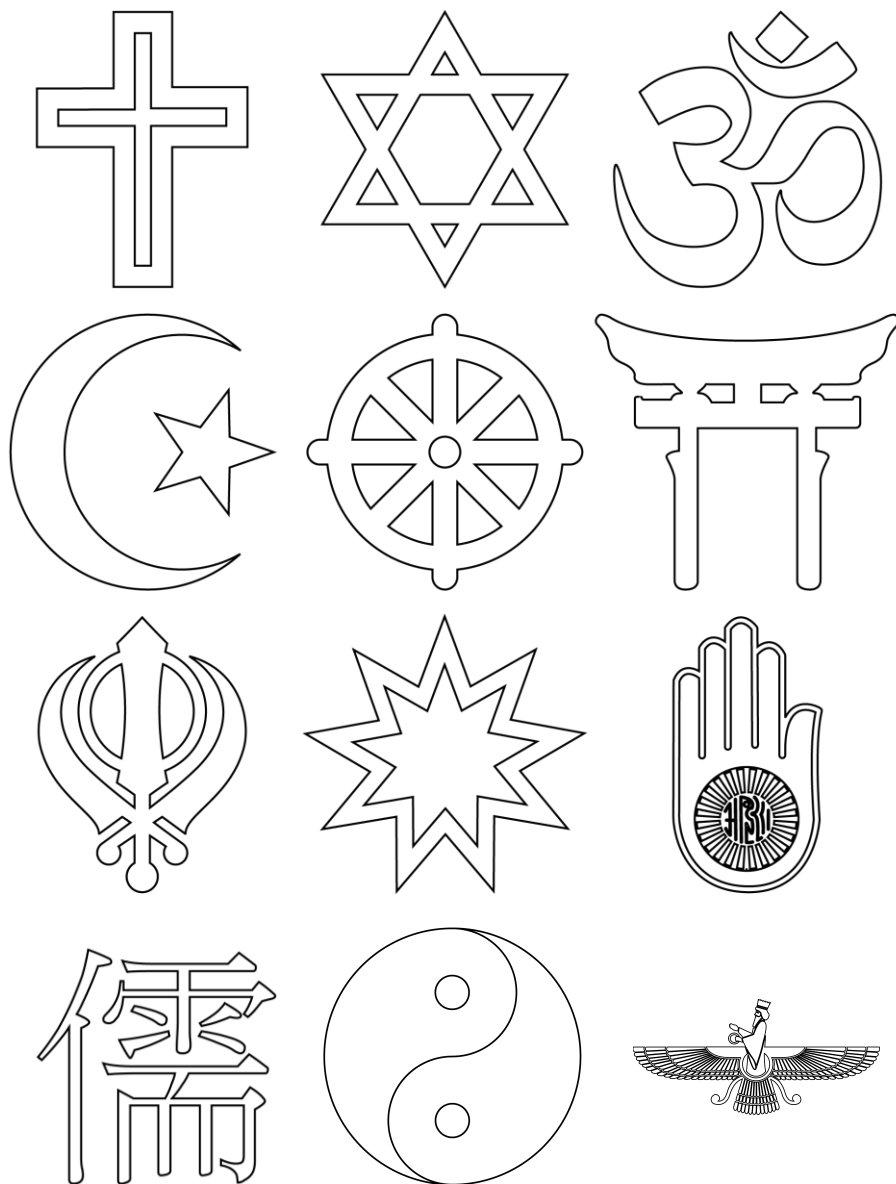


Oneness of Religion

for they rest upon the universal foundation of love...”

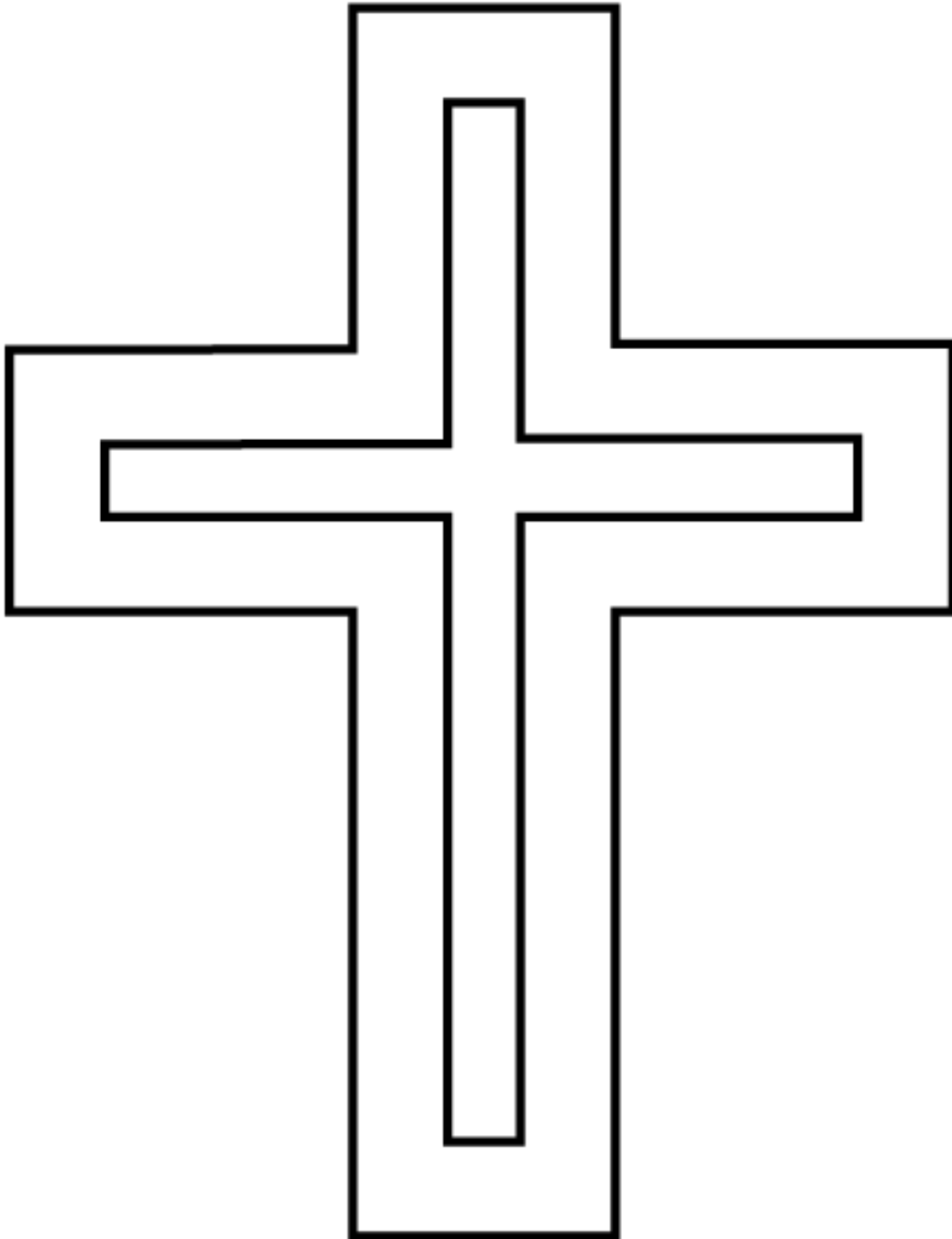

“In everything, do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets.”

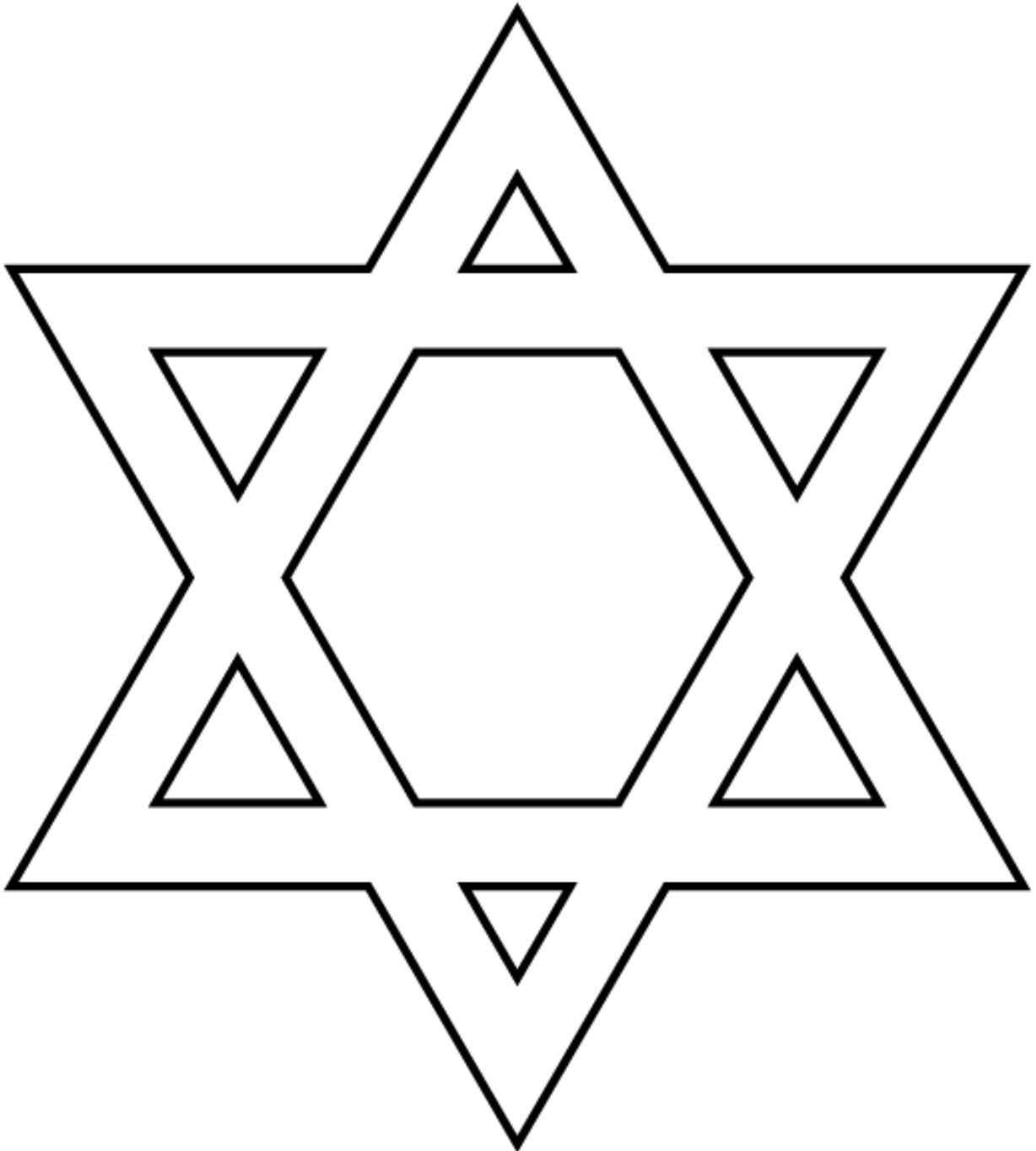

That is the whole Torah; the rest is the explanation.”

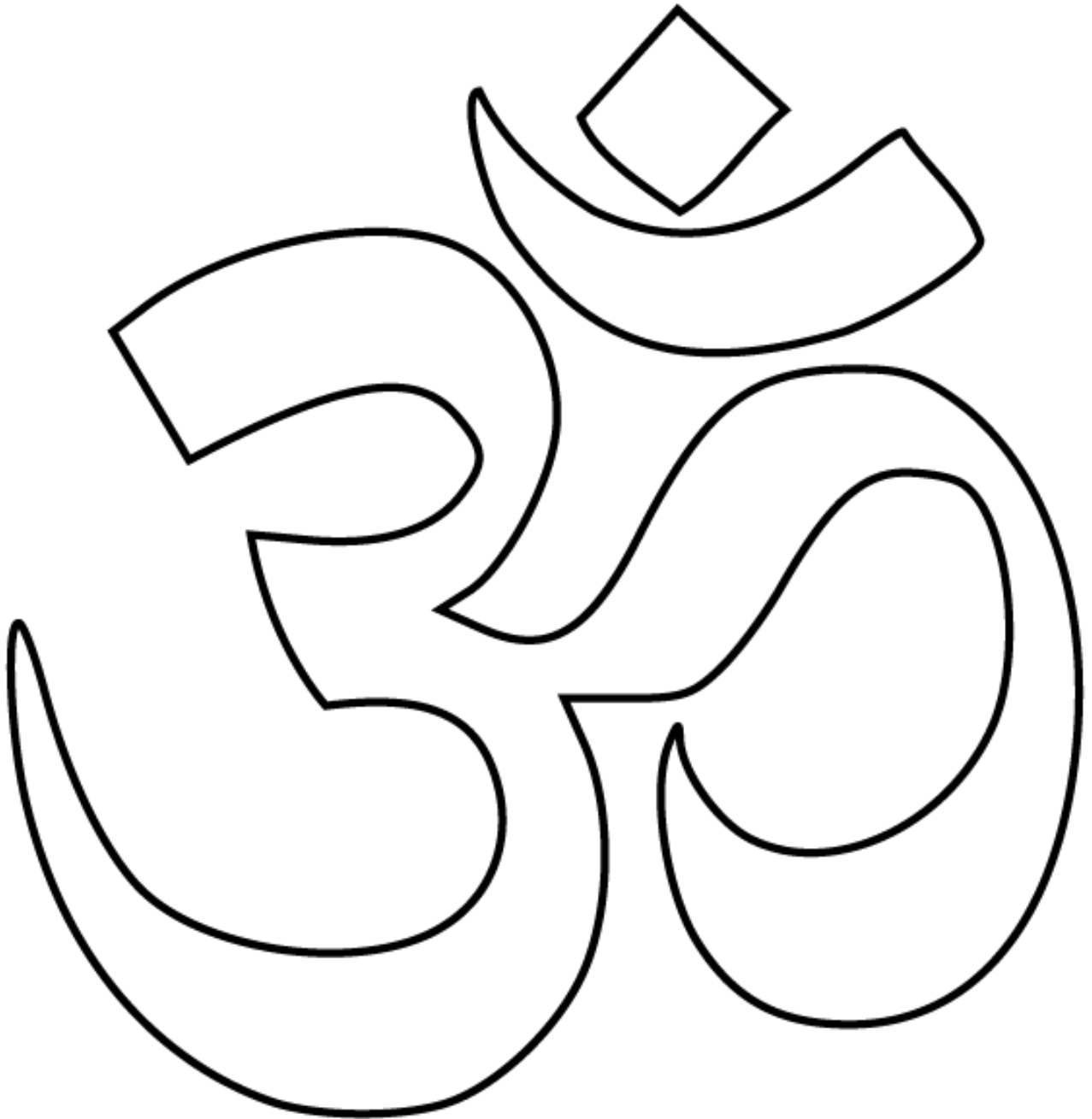

what would cause pain if done to you.”

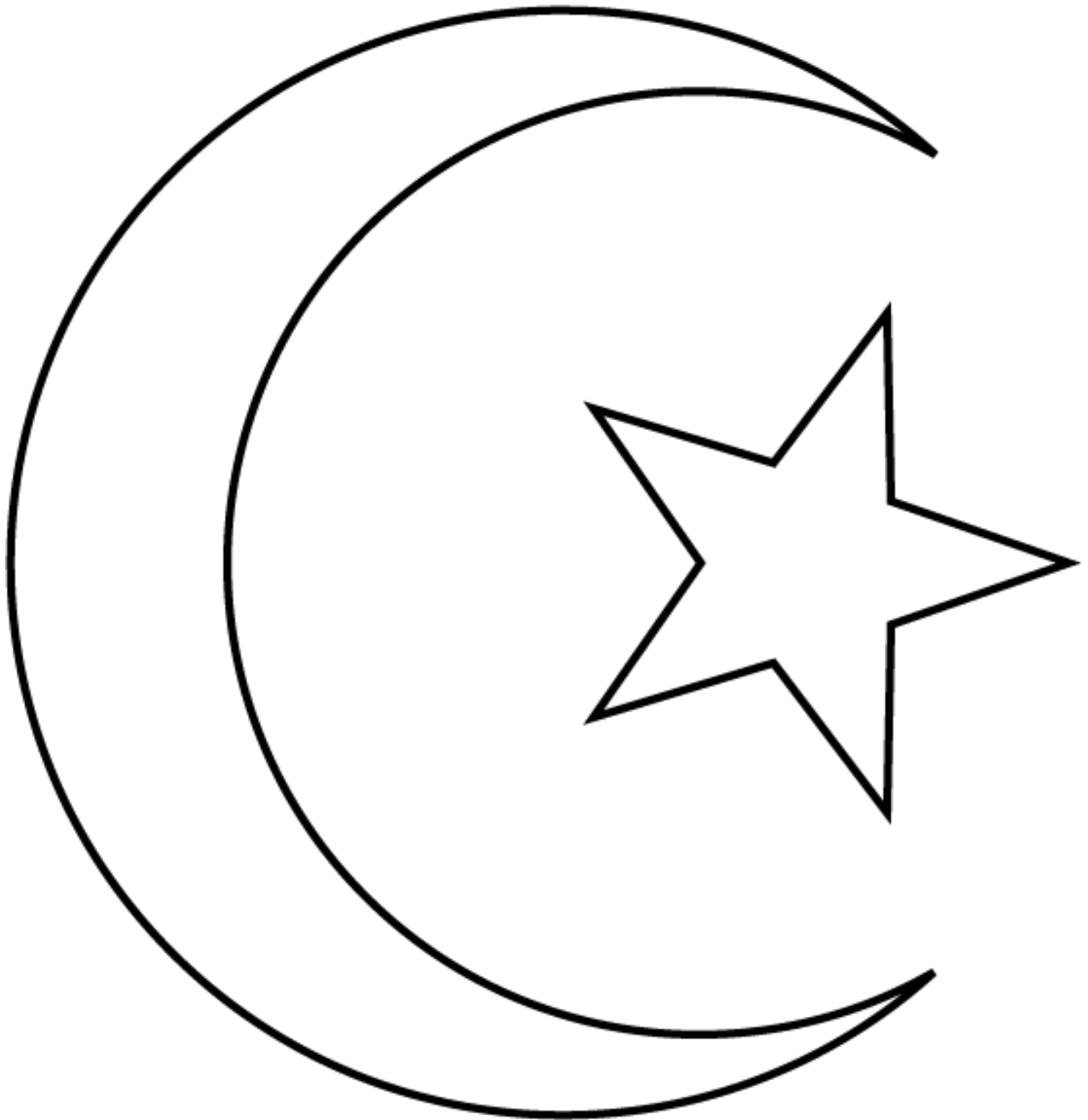

what you wish for yourself.”

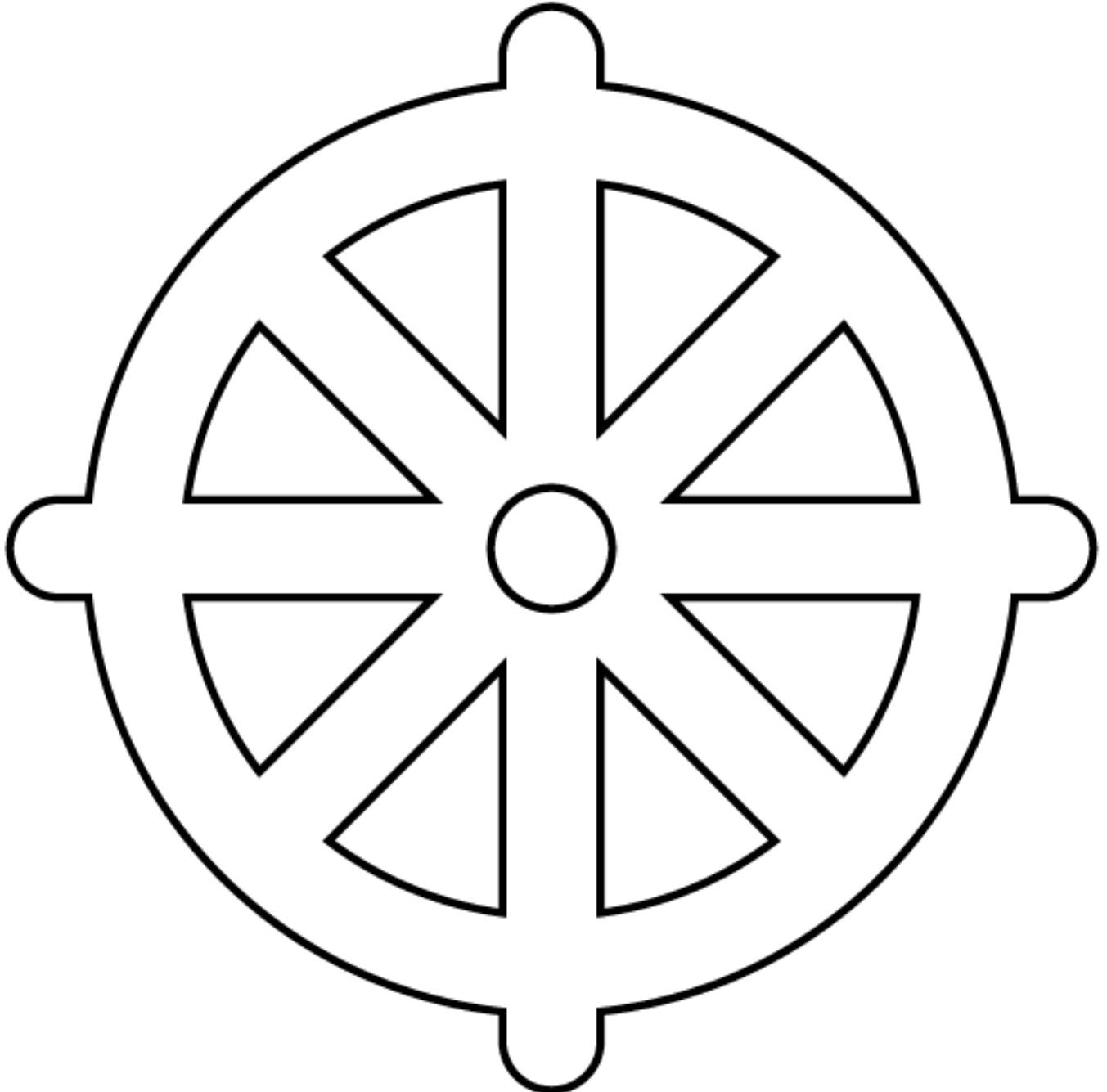

“Treat not others in ways that you yourself would find hurtful.”

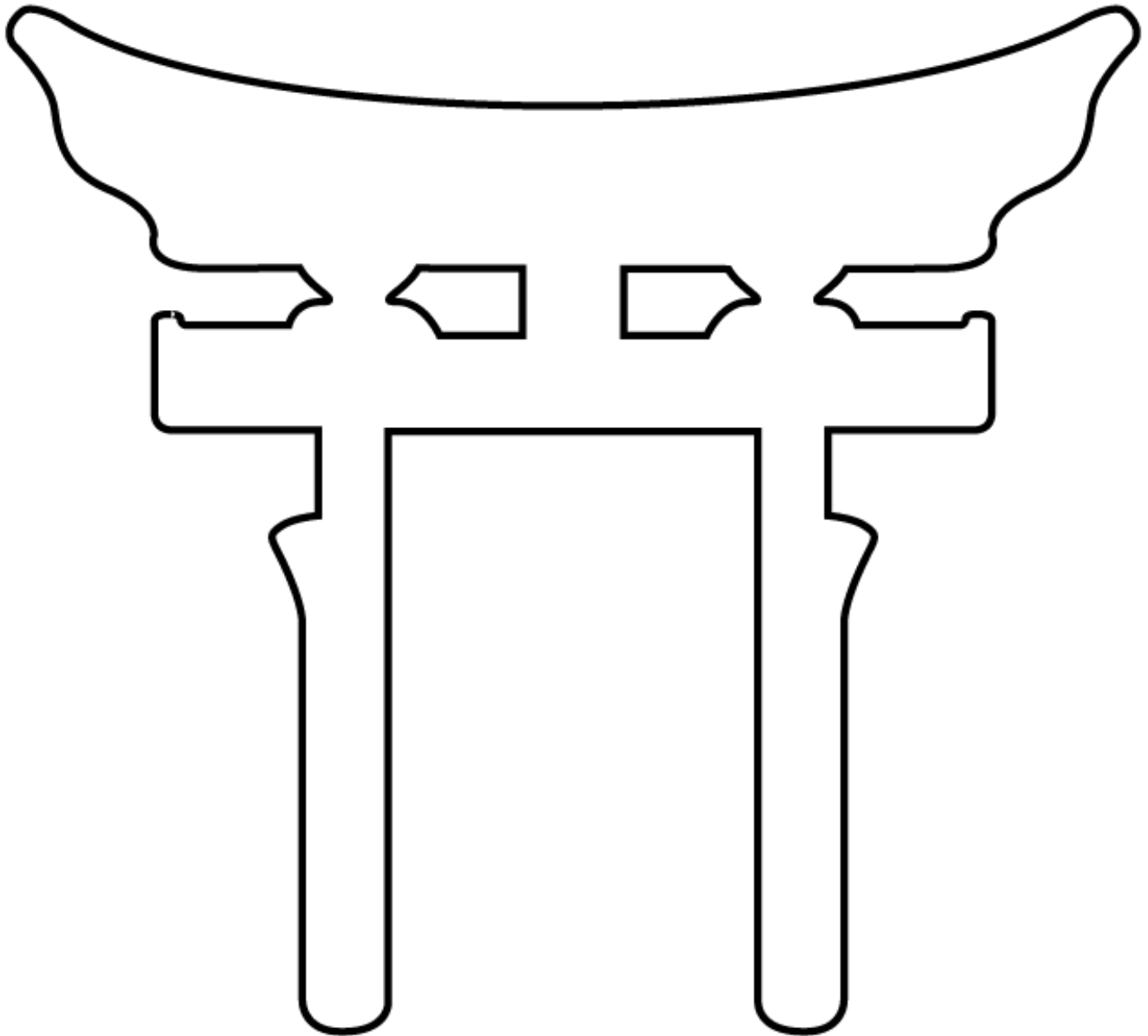

“The heart of the person before you is a mirror. See there your own form.”

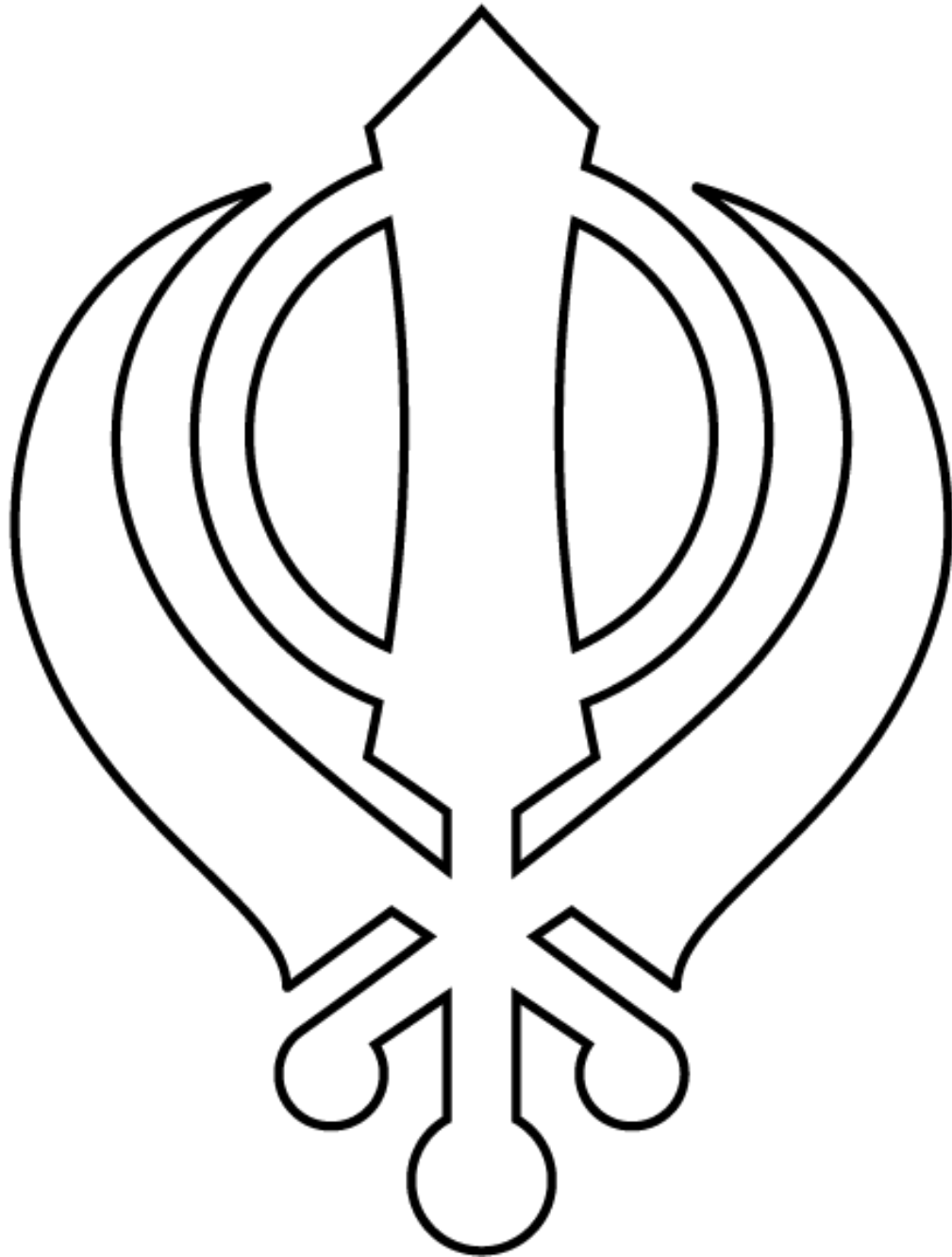

Indeed, I am a friend to all.”

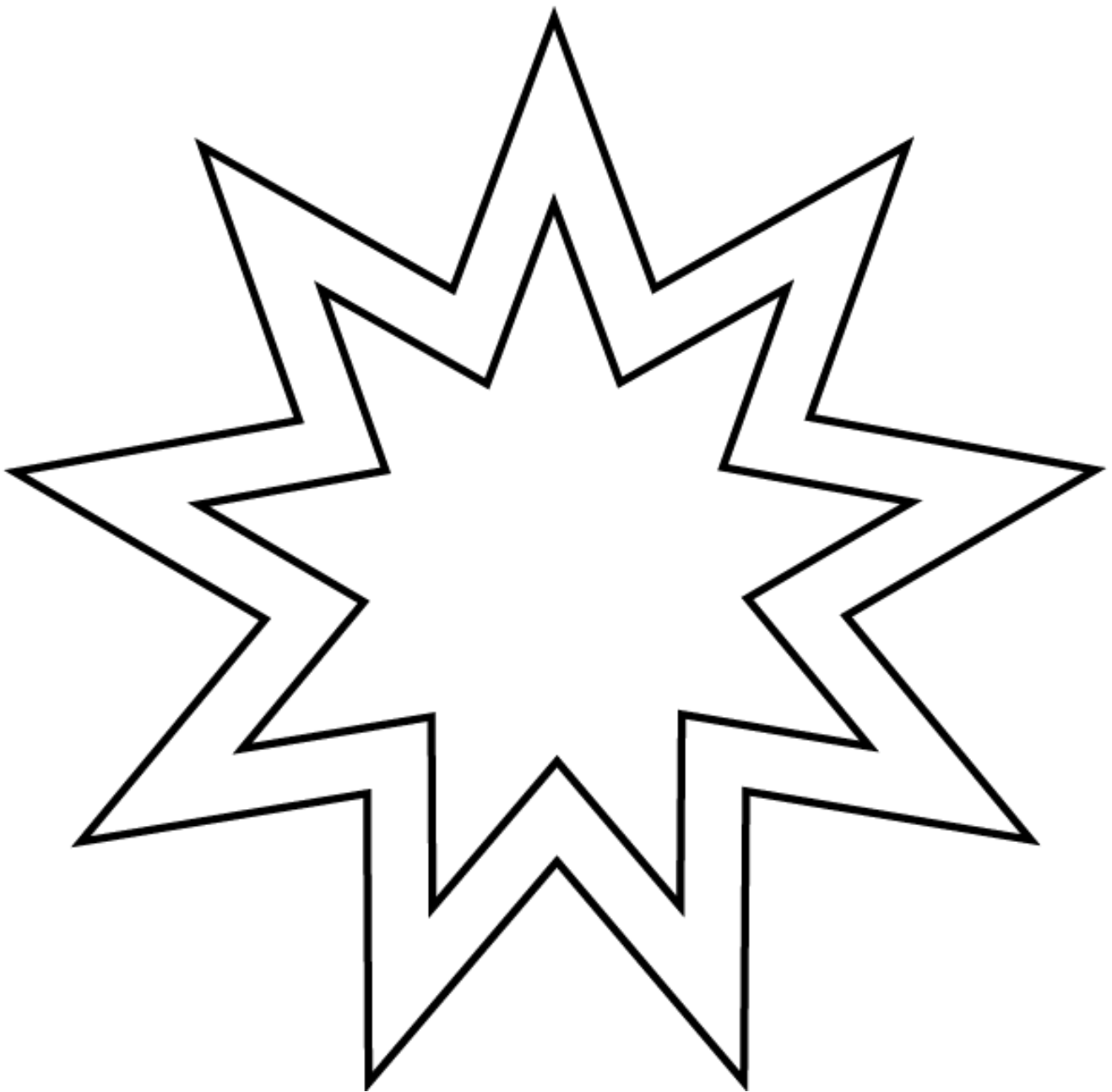

“Lay not on any soul a load that you would not wish to be laid upon you, and desire not for anyone the things you would not desire for yourself.”

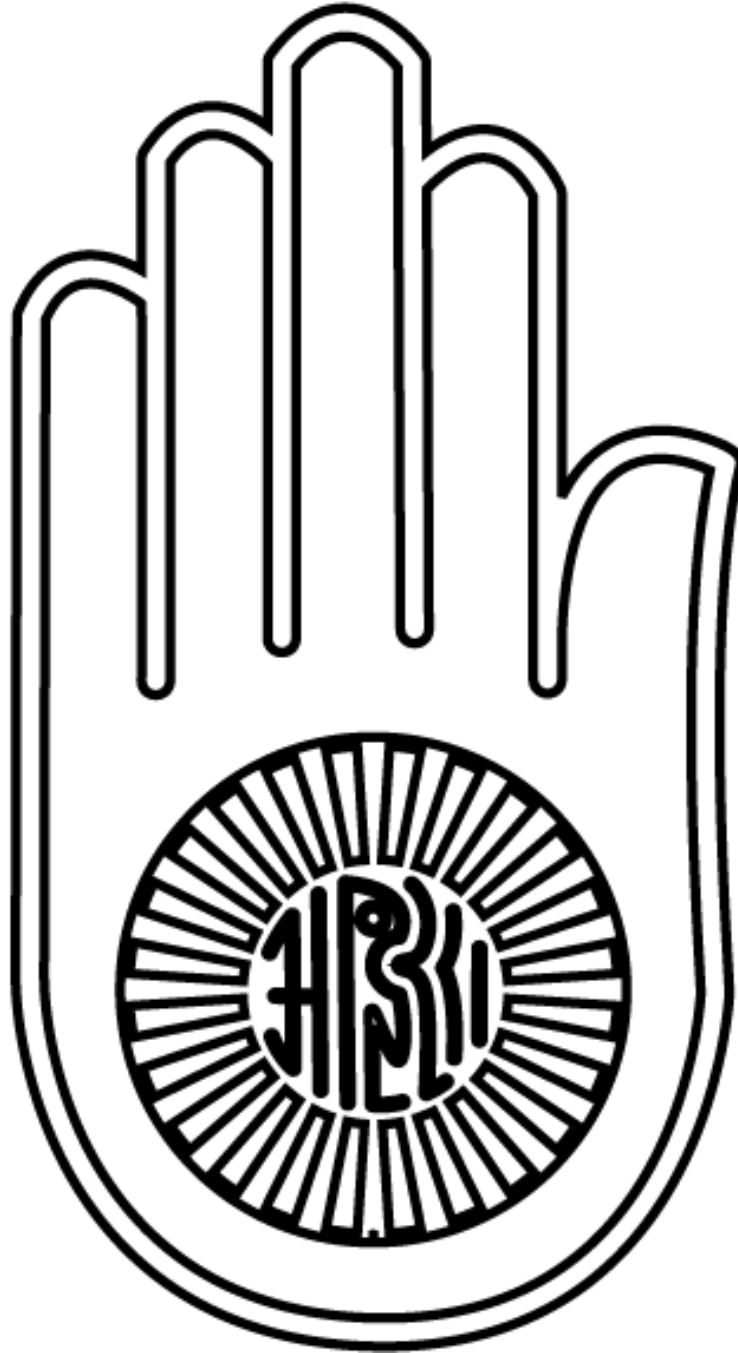

“What you do not wish for yourself, do not do to others.”

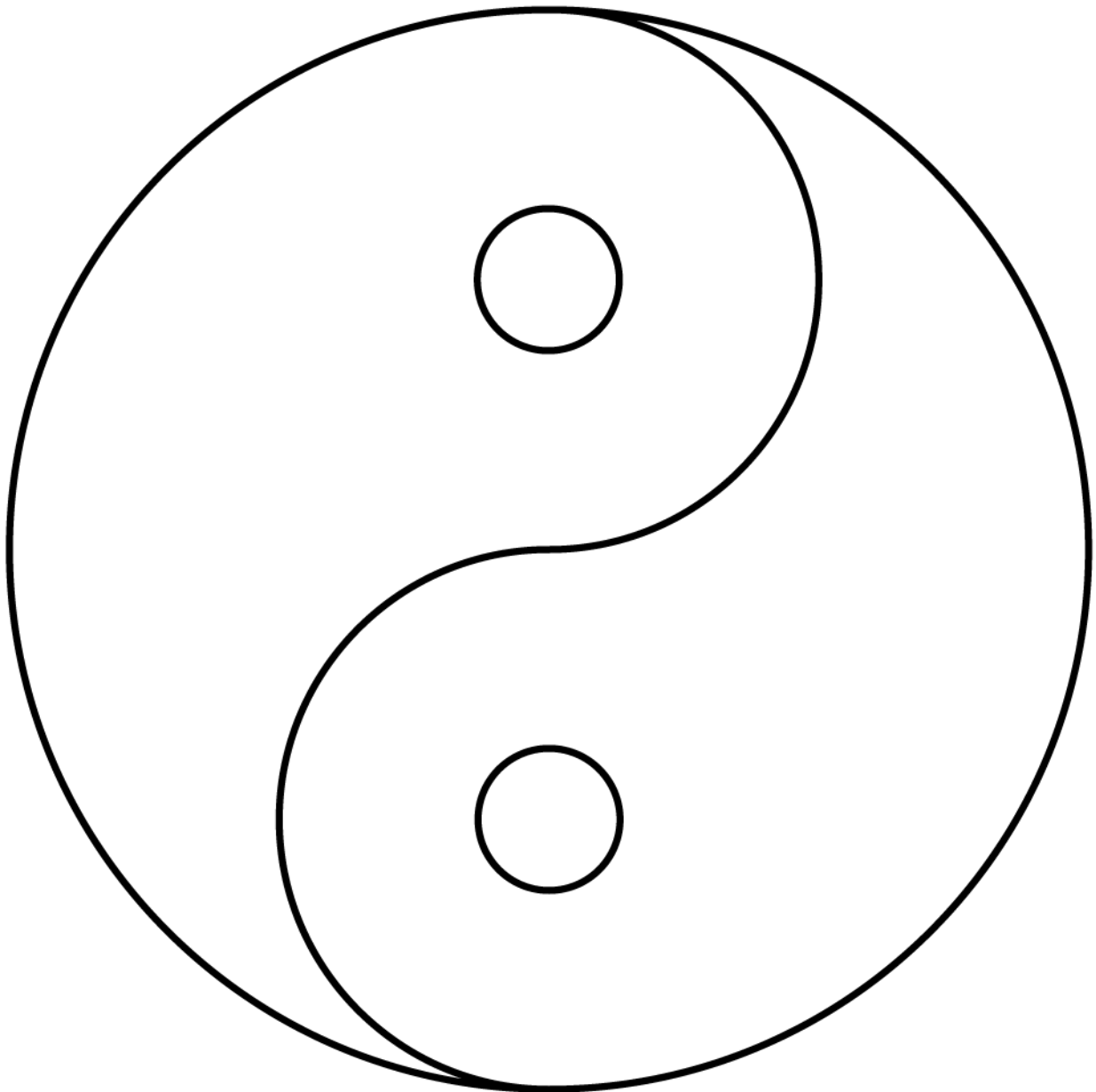
